SETTING UP CAMP

Welcome to Camp Here and There! Now first things first: We need to create an awesome place to spend the night. Will you camp out in a blanket fortress in your living room or will you brave the wild of your backyard? Wherever you choose, please make sure to share photos of your awesome accommodations on our GSNI-M Facebook page! Below (and in videos you'll find on GSNI-M's Facebook page on August 29th!) we'll show just a few ways to create your own campsite. We encourage you to build your space in whatever method and style inspires you. Have fun, be creative, and let's get started!

Option #1: The Backyard Base

Does your family have a tent? Awesome! Grab your grown-up and help set up camp in your yard. In addition to your tent, you'll want to grab a few other supplies, which may include:

- Sleeping bag
- Pillow
- Flashlight or lantern
- Bug spray
- Your favorite stuffed animal
- And some entertainment & snacks!

The steps to set-up your tent are:

- 1. Lay out your tent in an open area.
- 2. Assemble your tent poles.
- 3. Attach your tent poles to your tent.
- 4. Put the tent poles through the grommets at the corners of the base of your tent.
- 5. Secure the tent to the ground with stakes.







Option #2: The Living Room Blanket Fort

No tent? No problem! You can set up a comfy and cozy space in your house with just a few simple supplies. To make a blanket fort in your living room, bedroom, or basement, we recommend you gather up some materials such as:

- Sheets and blankets
- Sleeping bag
- Pillows
- Objects to hold blankets and sheets together, like clothespins, binder clips, tape, rubber bands, thumbtacks, string, or rope
- Objects to help with the structure of your tent, like wooden dowels, yardsticks, brooms, plastic tubes, or mops
- Books or other similar items to help weigh down your sheets and blankets
- And for extra fun, maybe some festive lights, stuffed animals, board games, books, and snacks!

Simple Fort

Look around your room and think of the ways that you can use your environment to help you with the structure of your fort. You can make a simple structure against a wall by simply using thumbtacks to stick your sheet to the wall (please get permission from your adult(s) before doing this step!) Then you'll just need to weigh down the other side of your sheet with something like a few heavy books or a piece of furniture. I just used a chair and draped the sheet over it. Then load up your fort with some blankets, pillows, a sleeping bag, snacks and some games!



Bigger Fort!

You could also try to build a larger, more elaborate blanket fort. First, ask your grownup if you can

commandeer your couch and living room! Then you'll need to outline your space by building your fort around your couch.

Grab a few chairs and drape blankets over them. On the inside of your fort, lay down lots of blankets, maybe use your couch cushions and some pillows for comfy walls, and then drape some blankets or sheets across the chairs.

You can add some height to your fort by sticking





some yardsticks or a broom in between your couch, then draping sheets over the top. To make your fort even cozier, hang some festive lights, grab your favorite stuffed animal and snacks, and enjoy! ©

Fajita Foil Packets

Prep Time: 15 minutes Cook Time: 15 minutes Total Time: 30 minutes

Servings: 4

Ingredients:

- 1.5 cups minute rice, brown or white
- 1.5 cups of water
- 1 pound boneless skinless chicken breasts, cut into thin strips
- 2 bell peppers, sliced into thin strips
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 packet fajita seasoning or taco seasoning, divided
- Tin foil, for wrapping

Optional Ingredients:

- Small flour tortillas
- Guacamole
- Salsa
- Sour Cream
- Fresh Cilantro
- Hot Sauce
- Limes

Directions:

- 1. Combine rice, water, and 2 tablespoons taco seasoning stir. Set aside for 5 minutes.
- 2. Add chicken, bell peppers, and onion to a large bowl. Drizzle with oil, and season with remaining taco seasoning packet, stirring gently to evenly coat everything.
- 3. Coat 4 large pieces (12 inches) of foil with cooking spray
- 4. Divide the rice and remaining liquid evenly between the pieces of tin foil. Add chicken and vegetables on top.
- 5. Bring the sides of tinfoil up, sealing the tinfoil closed to form foil packs, ready to cook.

To cook on the grill:

1. Preheat grill to medium heat. Add foil packets and close lid. Cook on medium to medium high heat, depending on your grill, for about 10-13 minutes or until chicken is cooked through. Add desired toppings and enjoy!

To cook in the oven:

1. Preheat oven to 425 degrees F. Place the foil packets on a baking tray and cook for 15-20 minutes or until chicken is cooked through. Add desired toppings and enjoy!

To cook over a campfire:

1. Cook in the hot coals of a fire for about 20 minutes or until chicken is cooked through. Add desired toppings and enjoy!



Cheesy Potatoes

Prep time: 10 minutes Cook time: 20 minutes

Servings: 4

Ingredients:

- 1 tsp garlic powder
- 1 tsp oregano, dried
- 1 tsp parsley
- 2 lbs Yukon golden potatoes
- Black pepper, ground (to taste)
- Salt (to taste)
- Red pepper flakes (to taste- adds some spice!)
- 2 Tbsp olive oil
- 2 cups mozzarella cheese
- 1 cup parmesan cheese

Directions:

- 1. Wash and clean your potatoes and dry with paper towels.
- 2. Chop the potatoes into 1 inch cubes.
- 3. In a bowl, combine the garlic powder, oregano, parsley, red pepper flakes, olive oil, salt and pepper. Mix well.
- 4. Mix the cubed potatoes into the mixture.
- 5. Place the potatoes into a foil packet and sprinkle the mozzarella cheese on top of the potatoes.
- 6. Cook over coals on the campfire.
- 7. Add parmesan cheese on top of the cooked potatoes.

Omelets in a Bag (Breakfast for Dinner!)

Ingredients:

- 1 freezer bag
- 2 eggs
- ½ cup of omelet filling of your choice: sausage, bacon, onions, cheese, mushrooms, etc.
- ¼ cup of cheese
- Tongs

- 1. Crack two eggs into a freezer/Ziploc bag. Add ingredients of your choice.
- 2. Zip and seal bag closed and smoosh it up with your hands.
- 3. If cooking multiple omelets, write each person's name on outside of bag.
- 4. Cook in a gently boiling water for 14-15 minutes.
- 5. Use tongs to pull the bag(s) out of the water and carefully pour the contents onto a plate.



Crescent Dogs

Prep Time: 5 minutes Total Time: 15 minutes

Servings: 8

Ingredients:

- 1 tube refrigerated crescent rolls
- 8 hot dogs
- Ketchup & mustard, or other hot dog toppings (optional!)

Directions:


- 1. On a flat surface, separate each crescent roll.
- 2. Take one hot dog and roll the crescent roll around the hot dog, make sure the end overlaps so that the crescent roll doesn't fall off the dog.
- 3. Repeat Step 2, until all hot dogs have a crescent roll around them.
- 4. Now slide the hot dog onto a stick
- 5. Cook crescent dogs over a campfire until the crescent roll is baked and browned.
- 6. Allow time to cool then add any hot dog toppings you'd like!

Pita Pizzas Over Fire

Ingredients:

- Pitas
- Pizza Sauce
- Meats of your choice: cooked ham, ground meat, sausage, pepperoni



- Heavy-duty aluminum foil
- Tongs
- Oven Mitt

- 1. Lay down a sheet of foil.
- 2. Place pita in the middle of the foil and add pizza sauce.
- 3. Add cheese, toppings, and meat choices on top of the pizza sauce.
- 4. Lightly close up the foil packet.
- 5. Place on coals on a grate over the fire or grill.
- 6. Cook until everything is warmed up and your cheese has melted
- 7. Allow time to cool off the fire/heat.



DESSERT RECIPES

Grilled Peaches with Yogurt

Servings: 1

Ingredients:

- 1 peach
- 1 spoonful of Greek or nonfat yogurt
- Drizzle of honey or chocolate syrup (optional)

Directions:

- Cut your peach in half. Place peach flesh-side down on a grill or grill pan that has been sprayed with nonstick spray. Cook over medium-low heat for 2-3 minutes. Light grill marks will appear.
- 2. Flip the fruit over and cook for another 1-2 minutes on the skin side.
- 3. Remove from the grill and let cool on a plate for 2-3 minutes
- 4. Place a spoonful of yogurt on top of the peach
- 5. Optional: Drizzle honey or chocolate syrup on top.
- 6. Enjoy

Triple Berry Crumble on the Grill

Servings: 4

Ingredients:

- Cast-iron skillet
- Spoonful of butter
- 1 cup blueberries
- 1 cup raspberries
- 1 cup strawberries, quartered
- ½ cup all-purpose flour
- ¼ cup brown sugar
- Dash of salt
- ¾ cup rolled oats
- 4 tbsp unsalted butter, melted
- Vanilla ice cream

- 1. Preheat the grill to 400 degrees F
- 2. Lightly coat two small 6.5" cast-iron skillets with butter.
- 3. Scoop ½ cup blueberries, ½ cup raspberries, ½ cup strawberries into each skillet.
- 4. Use a spoon to mix up the berries.
- 5. In a small bowl, combine flour, sugar, salt, and rolled oats. Pour in the melted butter and combine. Sprinkle on top of the berries.



- 6. Place the skillets onto the grill and close lid.
- 7. Cook for 20-25 minutes, until the berries bubble and the crumble is toasty and medium brown in color.
- 8. Remove from the grill and let cool.
- 9. Serve with a scoop of vanilla ice cream!

Cinnamon Roll on a Stick

Ingredients:

- Refrigerated crescent rolls
- ¼ cup sugar
- 1 Tbsp cinnamon
- Butter
- Skewer

Directions:

- Take one crescent roll and roll it around a skewer.
 Stick the end onto the skewer, so that crescent roll doesn't fall off.
- 2. Roast over a fire or a grill.
- 3. In a small bowl, combine sugar and cinnamon.
- 4. Once the crescent roll has cooked thoroughly, remove from heat and spread butter onto the roll.
- 5. Roll the bread in the cinnamon sugar mixture.
- 6. Allow time to cool.
- 7. Enjoy the tasty treat!

Frozen S'more Bars

Servings: 15

Ingredients:

- Marshmallow Fluff
- Graham Crackers
- Chocolate Jello
- 2.5 cups of cold Milk
- 4 oz cream cheese, softened
- 8 oz frozen whipped cream, thawed
- 9X13 pan



- 1. Line a 9X 13 plan with foil or parchment paper.
- 2. In a medium bowl, whisk together pudding mix and milk until smooth and creamy. Pour into 9 x 13 pan and spread into an even layer
- 3. Chill pudding layer until you mix up the marshmallow layer





- 4. In a medium bowl, beat together cream cheese and marshmallow cream until smooth. Fold in whipping topping.
- 5. Spread marshmallow layer over chocolate layer. Cover with foil.
- 6. Freeze layers about 6 hours, until firm enough to cut through. Use the foil or parchment paper to remove layer from 9X 13 pan and place onto a cutting board
- 7. Break 15 graham crackers in half. Slice pudding/marshmallow layers into 15 squares the same size as the graham crackers
- 8. Sandwich layers in between two graham crackers
- 9. Eat right away or store sandwiches in freezer-tight bag or container

The Grilled Banana Fluffernutter Sandwich

Ingredients:

For each sandwich you will need:

- 2 slices of white bread
- 2 Tablespoons butter, at room temperature
- 2 Tablespoons peanut butter
- 2 Tablespoons marshmallow creme or fluff
- 1/2 banana, sliced

- Spread the peanut butter onto one slice of bread.
- 2. Spread the marshmallow fluff on the other slice of bread.
- 3. Layer with sliced banana then close the sandwich.
- 4. Spread the outside of the sandwich with the softened butter.
- 5. Heat a grill pan over medium heat. Place the sandwiches in the pan and grill until both sides are golden brown, about 3-4 minutes per sides. Serve immediately with plenty of napkins (and maybe a fork!)

Make a Wind Chime

There are lots of different wind chimes you can make, either with items you find outside in your backyard or laying around waiting to be thrown away or recycled inside your house! Grab some supplies and join Sunny as she walks you through creating your very own wind chime!

Supplies:

- Sticks
- Pinecones
- String or yarn
- Beads
- Hanger
- Recycled items (plastic lids, bottle caps, tin cans, old CDs, cardboard tubes, old buttons, keys etc)
- Scissors
- Hammer and nail
- Decorating supplies (paint, paintbrushes, markers, feathers, glitter, colorful tape, etc)
- Any other materials you can think of!

- 1. First, you'll want to hunt down items you can use for your wind chime. You'll want to find items that can be easily moved in the wind if they're hanging from string. Above are some suggested items, but be creative and use whatever you can find in your backyard or around the house! Keep in mind not to use anything breakable—blustery days could ruin your wind chime!
- 2. You'll also need something as the top of your wind chime. This could be a round plastic lid from an old container, an old CD, an embroidery hoop, or a hanger.
- 3. Depending on what the material your top of your wind chime is, find a way to attach string to the top, whether you need to puncture holes in it (*carefully* and with an adults help!!) or if you can simply tie the string to it, like with a hanger. You'll also want to attach a piece of string to the top so you can hang your wind chime when it's finished!
- 4. Then attach your various items to your string! You can string on beads or buttons, poke holes in old bottle caps, paint sticks and tie them on—whatever you can think of!
- 5. Be creative, use your imagination, and have fun with this one!
- 6. Once you've finished your wind chime, find the perfect spot to hang it outside your home. Snag a picture and post it on our GSNI-M Facebook post!




Bottle cap & Bead Wind Chime

Owl Craft

Bring these supplies with you to the 8pm EDT Facebook Live session and join us while we make a picture of an owl!

Supplies:


- 1 sheet of black or blue construction paper
- Scraps of browns, whites, grays and black paper for the owl
- Bowl for paper scraps
- Bits of green, orange or yellow paper for the eyes, beak, and feet (optional!)
- Glue stick
- Scissors
- White crayon or pencil for drawing the outline

Directions:

1. First, on your black or blue piece of construction paper, use your pencil or white crayon to draw

an owl. You can either use this guide here, use your own imagination, or you can cut out the outline on the next page and trace around it onto your construction paper.

- 2. If you'd like, use your crayon to draw in some stars for your background!
- 3. After you have your owl outline ("owline" if you will.... ⊚) grab a bowl and sheets of brown, black, white, and gray construction paper.
- 4. Tear your paper into long strips then into small squares. Collect your paper scraps in your bowl. These paper scraps will be your owl's "feathers"!
- 5. Once you have a nice amount of scraps for your feathers, start with your owl's face. Apply a small amount of glue and then apply your feathers before your glue dries. Go ahead and cover up the area where your owl's eyes are—we can add those in later!




- 6. When it's time for adding in your eyes and beak, grab your scissors and cut out large white circles. Then you'll want to cut out some smaller yellow, green, or orange circles to go inside the white circles for your owl's eyes.
- 7. Cut out a triangle out of your yellow or orange paper for a beak for your owl.
- 8. When you move on to doing your owl's wings and belly feathers, try to use some different colors so they don't blend together. You want to be able to tell where her feathers and chest/tummy area are!
- 9. After you've filled in all of your owl's face, wings, and chest/belly feathers, you can use your yellow or orange paper to make her feet (if you'd like to include those!) You can use the paper tearing method, or just cut out feet-shaped pieces and glue them on.
- 10. Feel free to add a moon into your background, a branch for your owl to perch on, or any other elements to your picture.
- 11. Display your artwork proudly. Good job! ☺

Extra Activities for You to Enjoy on Your Own!

Campfire Story Stones

By Crafts on Sea Blog

Supplies:

- Acrylic Paint or chalk pens
- Flat rocks
- Paint brushes
- Newspaper or table cloth
- Bowl of water



- 1. Wash off flat rocks and make sure that the rocks are completely dry.
- 2. Draw or paint one picture on each rock.
- 3. Since we are camping, think of items that you might take with you camping or items in nature.
 - a. Examples: Tent, tree, an owl, a campfire, some stars, the moon, the sun, or a bat.
- 4. Allow time to dry.
- 5. Once rocks are dry, take turns creating a story using your rocks!

Citrus Bird Feeder

Supplies:

- Rinds (Oranges & lemons)
- Pushpin
- Embroidery needle
- Twine
- ½ cup Wild Bird Variety Bird Seed
- 1 tablespoon peanut butter

Directions for Citrus Cup:

- 1. Take one half of an orange or lemon rind. This will be your citrus cup!
- 2. Once your needle is threaded, tie a knot at the end. Push your embroidery needle through one side of your citrus cup. Keep pushing until you go through the other side. Bring slack to the middle so that you can hang your citrus cup. Now go to another hole and bring the needle with twine through and repeat step 1.
- 3. Pull slack of second string up to meet the first slack. Tie knot on outside of citrus cup.

Directions for making Bird Seed:

- 1. Take ½ cup wild bird variety bird seed and mix in a tablespoon of peanut butter.
- 2. Take a spoon and mix the two together. Scoop your mixture into your citrus cup.





Now, pick the perfect tree and hang your citrus bird feeder up! Can you identify what birds visit your bird feeder?

Echolocation Game

Supplies:

- Blindfold
- An open area
- Family members to play with!

- 1. Did you know that bats use their ears to help them "see" their environment? Bats make noises and listen carefully to the echoes to determine where an object is located. Bats and other animals, like dolphins, use this skill called "Tabalasstian" to halp find food and pavigate the
 - "Echolocation" to help find food and navigate their surroundings.
- 2. Assign yourself or one of your family members to be the bat. The person who is the bat will put on the blindfold. No peeking! ©
- 3. Now the rest of your family members are insects. Insects should quietly spread out around the bat.
- 4. When the bat is ready, clap once! Family members should clap back and the bat has to try and guess where people are standing based on their sounds.
- 5. Can the bat correctly locate where the sound is coming from?
- 6. Take turns being the bat and see how well you can "see" with your ears!
